PRAYER OF THE WEEK


Lord, please keep watch over your faithful people, strengthen those fleeing persecution, and protect the holy soil of Armenia—now and always. Foil every aggressor

SUNDAY BIBLE READINGS

Bible Readings for Sunday, December 29, 2024 Sixth Sunday of Advent

HEBREWS 7:11-25

Now if perfection had been attainable through the levitical priesthood—for the people received the law under this priesthood—what further need would there have been to speak of another priest arising according to the order of Melchizedek, rather than one according to the order of Aaron? For when there is a change in the priesthood, there is necessarily a change in the law as well. Now the one of whom these things are spoken belonged to another tribe, from which no one has ever served at the altar. For it is evident that our Lord was descended from Judah, and in connection with that tribe Moses said nothing about priests.

It is even more obvious when another priest arises, resembling Melchizedek, one who has become a priest, not through a legal requirement concerning physical descent, but through the power of an indestructible life. For it is attested of him,

'You are a priest for ever, according to the order of Melchizedek.'

There is, on the one hand, the abrogation of an earlier commandment because it was weak and ineffectual (for the law made nothing perfect);

there is, on the other hand, the introduction of a better hope, through which we approach God.

This was confirmed with an oath; for others who became priests took their office without an oath, but this one became a priest with an oath, because of the one who said to him,

'The Lord has sworn and will not change his mind,

"You are a priest for ever" '— accordingly Jesus has also become the guarantee of a better covenant.

Furthermore, the former priests were many in number, because they were prevented by death from continuing in office; but he holds his priesthood permanently, because he continues for ever. Consequently he is able for all time to save those who approach God through him, since he always lives to make intercession for them.

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO

LUKE 19:12-28


So he said, 'A nobleman went to a distant country to get royal power for himself and then return. He summoned ten of his slaves, and gave them ten pounds, and said to them, "Do business with these until I come back." But the citizens of his country hated him and sent a delegation after him, saying, "We do not want this man to rule over us." When he returned, having received royal power, he ordered these slaves, to whom he had given the money, to be summoned so that he might find out what they had gained by trading. The first came forward and said, "Lord, your pound has made ten more pounds." He said to him, "Well done, good slave! Because you have been trustworthy in a very small thing, take charge of ten cities." Then the second came, saying, "Lord, your pound has made five pounds." He said to him, "And you, rule over five cities." Then the other came, saying, "Lord, here is your pound. I wrapped it up

in a piece of cloth, for I was afraid of you, because you are a harsh man; you take what you did not deposit, and reap what you did not sow." He said to him, "I will judge you by your own words, you wicked slave! You knew, did you, that I was a harsh man, taking what I did not deposit and reaping what I did not sow? Why then did you not put my money into the bank? Then when I returned, I could have collected it with interest." He said to the bystanders, "Take the pound from him and give it to the one who has ten pounds." (And they said to him, "Lord, he has ten pounds!") "I tell you, to all those who have, more will be given; but from those who have nothing, even what they have will be taken away. But as for these enemies of mine who did not want me to be king over them—bring them here and slaughter them in my presence."

After he had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem.


HOLIDAY GREETINGS FROM THE PRELACY



HOLY APOSTLE JAMES AND JOHN THE EVANGELIST





On Saturday, December 28, the Armenian Church commemorates the Holy Apostle James and John the Evangelist. Both held prominent positions among the twelve apostles, and they were called "Sons of Thunder" by Jesus (Mark 3:17) probably because they were impetuous and quick tempered as suggested in Luke 9:54 and Mark 10:35-41. James was a Galilean fisherman, who was called along with his brother John, to be two of the twelve apostles. They, together with Peter, formed the inner core among the twelve who were present at the raising of the daughter of Jarius, the Transfiguration, and the agony of Gethsemane. James was the first of the apostles to be martyred by order of Herod Agrippa (Acts 12:1-2). He is the patron saint of Spain and according to tradition his body was brought from Jerusalem to Santiago de Compostela, which became and continues to be a popular destination for

pilgrims. John is also known as "The Divine." It was to John that Jesus on the cross entrusted the care of his mother (John 19:27).

THE SEASON OF ADVENT



ADVENT IN ARMENIAN APOSTOLIC CHURCH

"Establish your hearts, for the coming of the Lord is at hand." (James 5:8)

This Sunday, December 29, is the sixh Sunday of Advent.

Did you know that the season of Advent has been on our Church calendar for centuries? If you did not know much about this season, it is never late to learn. It is a period consisting of fifty days preceding the feast of Nativity of our Lord. It prescribes a spiritual discipline. During this time the faithful are admonished to prepare themselves worthily to celebrate the Lord's coming into the world as the incarnate love of God, and make their souls fitting abodes for him.

The Sixth Sunday's message has to do with investing our talents. Through the Parable of the Ten Minas (Luke 19:1-28) The lesson here is that faithfulness in small matters will always bring disproportionate rewards where the Lord's work is concerned. And even though the timing is the Second Coming, the lesson is universal. For example, our willingness to share the Gospel with even one person could result in a thousand souls saved over time. Just as each servant was

given the same amount of money, we've all been given the same basic truth of the gospel. By his own admission, the third servant proved he didn't know his master. His perception of the man was all wrong, and while he called himself a servant, he didn't do even the minimum that was asked of Him. He represents the "in name only" Christian who really has nothing, and will be surprised to find even that being taken away.
