
PRAYER OF THE WEEK

Jesus Heals Two Blind Men

As they were leaving Jericho, a large crowd followed him. There were two blind men sitting by the roadside. When they heard that Jesus was

passing by, they shouted, "Lord, have mercy on us, Son of David!" The crowd sternly ordered them to be quiet; but they shouted even more loudly, "Have mercy on us, Lord, Son of David!" Jesus stood still and called them, saying, "What do you want me to do for you?" They said to him, "Lord, let our eyes be opened." Moved with compassion, Jesus touched their eyes. Immediately they regained their sight and followed him.

The Triumphal Entry

When they had come near Jerusalem and had reached Bethphage, at the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two disciples, saying to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately you will find a donkey tied, and a colt with her; untie them and bring them to me. If anyone says anything to you, just say this, 'The Lord needs them.' And he will send them immediately." This took place to fulfill what had been spoken through the prophet, saying,

"Tell the daughter of Zion, Look, your king is coming to you, humble, and mounted on a donkey, and on a colt, the foal of a donkey."

The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road. The crowds that went ahead of him and that followed were shouting,

"Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!"

When he entered Jerusalem, the whole city was in turmoil, asking, "Who is this?" The crowds were saying, "This is the prophet Jesus from Nazareth in Galilee."

Jesus Cleanses the Temple

Then Jesus entered the temple and drove out all who were selling and buying in the temple, and he overturned the tables of the money changers and the seats of those who sold doves. He said to them, "It is written, 'My house shall be called a house of prayer'; but you are making it a den of robbers."

The blind and the lame came to him in the temple, and he cured them. But when the chief priests and the scribes saw the amazing things that he did, and heard the children crying out in the temple, "Hosanna to the Son of David," they became angry and said to him, "Do you hear what these are saying?" Jesus said to them, "Yes; have you never read, 'Out of the mouths of infants and nursing babies you have prepared praise for yourself'?"

He left them, went out of the city to Bethany, and spent the night there.

LITURGICAL CALENDAR AND NEWS FROM PRELACY CROSSROADS

ST. ILLUMINATOR'S SPONSORS PRELACY'S REPRINT OF COMMENTARY ON THE NICENE CREED



In commemorating the 1700th anniversary of the Council of Nicaea in 325 AD, the Eastern Prelacy has reprinted the bilingual edition of the Commentary on the Nicene Creed by Archbishop Zareh Aznavorian (1947-2004). St. Illuminator's Cathedral (New York City) generously sponsored the reprinting, just as they had the first edition.

On Wednesday, April 2, His Eminence Archbishop Anoushavan, Prelate, formally presented the book to Rev. Fr. Mesrob Lakissian, pastor of St. Illuminator's Cathedral. The Prelate commended Fr. Mesrob and the Board of Trustees, as well as the entire St. Illuminator's community, for underwriting the cost of publication and for their steadfast support of the Prelacy's programs and projects, both locally and abroad.

We encourage our parishes to promote this book and utilize it as a valuable resource for teaching the Nicene Creed (Havadamk). The Nicene Creed is the official declaration of faith, formulated and ratified at the Council of Nicaea and later expanded in the fourth century in response to heretical teachings.

Originally published by the Eastern Prelacy in 2013, this book represents a synopsis of a 17-part lecture series delivered by Archbishop Zareh in Lebanon in 1999. The English translation was prepared by Archdeacon Shant Kazanjian, Director of Christian Education of the Eastern Prelacy.



REMEMBRANCE OF THE RAISING OF LAZARUS



This Saturday, April 12, we commemorate the Raising of Lazarus as told in the Gospel of John, Chapter 11. Lazarus and his sisters Mary and Martha were good friends of Jesus. Their home in Bethany (near Jerusalem) was Jesus' home whenever he was in Jerusalem. Lazarus' sudden death threw his sisters into deep mourning. Jesus also wept for his friend. John's gospel account emphasizes the fact that Lazarus was indeed dead by pointing out that his body was in the tomb. Jesus' raising of Lazarus convinced many people of his divine powers, and according to John, the authorities took steps to try to silence him.

Lazarus represents humankind and Bethany represents the whole world. The major themes of this day are the forthcoming victory of Christ over death, the supreme sacrifice of love, and the resurrection as the ultimate triumph of love.

The forty days of Great Lent (Medz Bahk) come to an end with Vespers on Friday prior to the commemoration of the Raising of Lazarus. A new fasting period for Holy Week begins on Monday and continues through Holy Saturday.

Palm Sunday

This Sunday, April 13, is Palm Sunday, which commemorates Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem and the beginning of Holy Week. The Church is joyful after forty days of repentance. Christ is coming to Jerusalem. He is coming in the name of the Lord in fulfillment of the prophecy (Zechariah 9:9-16).

Rejoice, O Jerusalem, and adorn your bridal chamber, O Sion, for behold your King Christ, seated on the new colt, shows meekness and comes to enter into your chamber. ... Cry aloud, Hosanna, blessed is he that comes in the name of the Lord, who has great mercy.

(From the Introit of Palm Sunday)



ON PALM SUNDAY

"The disciples went and did as Jesus had directed them; they brought the donkey and the colt, and put their cloaks on them, and he sat on them. A very large crowd spread their cloaks on the road, and others cut branches from the trees and spread them on the road" (Matthew 21:7-8). The triumphal entrance of Christ to Jerusalem is what we celebrate on Palm Sunday.

The Armenian name of the feast is Ծωημωqωρη (Dzaghgazart, literally "Flower Ornament"), different from other languages: Palm Sunday, Domingo de Ramos ("Branches Sunday," in Spanish), et cetera. This shows that the Armenian name has a special meaning. Like many other feasts of our religious calendar, the advent of Christianism absorbed and adapted a pagan celebration.

Around this date, there was the celebration of the ancient feast of spring, which was also dedicated to trees and flowers, and contained the idea of the Tree of Life. It was common to decorate the trees with colorful pieces of cloth, and for this reason the feast of Dzaghgazart took the popular name of Ծարգարդար (Dzarzartar "Ornamenting of Trees").

During Dzaghgazart, in different regions of Armenia they prepared marionettes related to rain and drought, which had different names, even though the most common one was Unlph (Noori). Scholars have assumed that it was a representation of the water divinity Nar. The marionettes were made of brooms or wood, and their face was made with white cloth. They were also endowed with a belt made of colorful fabric, a veil with brilliant beads, and a flower crown on the head.

A procession took Noori through squares and neighborhoods. People threw pitchers of water over the procession from windows and doors, and gave little gifts to the participants.







The program is simple. We order Groceries online from the supermarket in Armenia, which are paid for here in the United States. The groceries are delivered the next day to the families. In addition to the families we have "adopted", we have started to help several families from Artsakh who are now living in villages in Armenia.

Response to our AGM (Armenian Grocery Ministry) has been extremely positive and we hope to continue this work for as long as it is needed.






