


PRAYER OF THE WEEK

Sunday of the World Church (Green Sunday)

1 PETER 2:1-10

Rid yourselves, therefore, of all malice, and all guile, insincerity, envy, and all slander. Like newborn infants, long for the pure, spiritual milk, so that by it you may grow into salvation— if indeed you have tasted that the Lord is good.

Come to him, a living stone, though rejected by mortals yet chosen and precious in God's sight, and like living stones, let yourselves be built into a spiritual house, to be a holy priesthood, to offer spiritual sacrifices acceptable to God through Jesus Christ. For it stands in scripture: "See, I am laying in Zion a stone,

a cornerstone chosen and precious; and whoever believes in him will not be put to shame."

To you then who believe, he is precious; but for those who do not believe.

"The stone that the builders rejected has become the very head of the corner,"

and "A stone that makes them stumble, and a rock that makes them fall."

They stumble because they disobey the word, as they were destined to do.

But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness into his marvelous light.

Once you were not a people, but now you are God's people; once you had not received mercy, but now you have received mercy.



Nicodemus said to him, "How can these things be?" Jesus answered him, "Are you a teacher of Israel, and yet you do not understand these things?

LITURGICAL CALENDAR AND NEWS FROM PRELACY CROSSROADS

GREEN SUNDAY, SUNDAY OF THE WORLD CHURCH



Easter Sunday is followed by a period of fifty days (Hinoonk). This period from the Resurrection to Pentecost (Hokekaloost) is dedicated to the glorification of the Resurrection. Each of the seven Sundays of Hinoonk has a special name. This Sunday, May 4, is Green Sunday (Ganach Giragi), also called Sunday of the World Church (Ashkharhamadoor), that commemorates the establishment in Jerusalem of the first Christian church where Christ met with the Apostles in the upper room.

Green Sunday most probably originates in an ancient holiday celebrating spring. Our forefathers, seeing mother earth bloom after long winter months, glorified the Creator with an act of thanksgiving and celebrated by decorating the church and themselves with greenery. The reawakening of nature is symbolic of the Resurrection. Green is the color of life, freshness, and promise. After a barren winter and with the Resurrection we are filled with hope, life, and love.

Green Sunday is the perfect time for us to remember and strengthen our obligations as good stewards of the earth and caretakers of the gifts given to us by God.

You nations, made worthy to be called to give glory to Christ our God, come, sing to the Lord a new song, rejoice and praise his name with a new praise with the voice of Joy. O Christ, we who believe in you with true confession bless the mystery of your divine, life-giving economy glorifying your wonderful and awesome name, O Lord, Lord great over all the earth. Holy Church, bride initiated into the heavenly mystery, rejoice to the glory of the all-Holy Trinity who has adorned you with all its gifts and who is to crown you with glory the divine light with all his saints.

ON GENOCIDE MEMORIAL DAY, ARCHBISHOP ANOUSHAVAN WARNS AGAINST THE SINS OF FORGETTING



On Sunday, April 27, a joint Divine Liturgy was celebrated on the occasion of Genocide Memorial Day at the St. Vartan Cathedral of New York. His Grace Bishop Mesrop, Primate, celebrated the Divine Liturgy and His Eminence Archbishop Anoushavan, Prelate, delivered the sermon. Rev. Fr Mesrob Lakissian, Pastor of St. Illuminator's Cathedral, also participated in the service.

After the Divine Liturgy, the audience marched from St. Vartan Cathedral to Times Square to participate in the traditional genocide commemoration.

In his sermon, Archbishop Anoushavan said:

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I am grateful to the Almighty Lord, that in the footsteps of the former Primate Archbishop Khajag Barsamian and the former Prelate Archbishop Oshagan Choloyan, who established a tradition of offering a joint, Holy Badarak on the centennial anniversary of the Armenian Genocide, here, on the 110th anniversary, with my spiritual Brother, His Grace Bishop Mesrop Parsamyan, again we are offering the Holy Badarak to the glory of the Crucified and Risen Lord Jesus Christ, and in honor of our one and half million martyrs.

We are here for Remembrance and Thanksgiving, as well as for Commitment.

- a) We are here to remember and invoke the martyrdom of our parents and grandparents. We are here also to thank the Almighty Lord because after being uprooted from our five-thousand-year-old ancestral lands, but led by His Providential care, we were welcomed and hosted in different countries, and particularly to the United States. We are thankful that as former sojourners, now we are well established citizens in respectful hosting countries. We are thankful that as a distinct nation, we are part and parcel of the larger family of nations.
- b) We are here also to renew our commitment to raising our voice for justice and our rights. We learn from the Holy Scripture that the Almighty Source of Life called upon Cain for accountability, asking him, "Cain, where is Abel, your brother?" Upon the denial of the latter, the Righteous God gave the verdict (Gen 4:8-12). Hence, it is not only divinely ordained, but it is our bounden duty to demand accountability from the executioners for the extermination of almost half of our nation.

In recent years, we hear more often that it is time to forgive, to forget and to move on. As Christians, truly it is our duty to forgive, as Jesus Himself commanded that we must do so not only once or seven times, but seventy times seven times (Mt)18:21-22. Unfortunately, as Cain denied assuming responsibility for his audacious action by saying, "Am I my brother's keeper?", likewise the perpetrators of the unprecedented Genocide not only ask for forgiveness, but deny and distort the crime, and moreover, their descendants continue their so-called unaccomplished misdeeds. Actually, we all witnessed that the end of the twentieth century and the beginning of the twenty-first have been marked by a string of genocidal acts against Armenians, from the Sumgait, Kirovabad, Baku, and Maragha pogroms and the uprooting of 300,000 Armenians from Azerbaijan, followed by the cultural genocide in Nakhichevan and, most recently, the forced deportation of 120,000 Armenians from Artsakh, preceded by a nine-month-long inhumane blockade. Finally, Azerbaijan, which was created barely a century ago, shamelessly declares that historic Armenia should be deemed "Western Azerbaijan."

My dear brothers and sisters, to forget the Armenian Genocide means nothing less than escapism from reality. It means willingly to ignore our conscious commitment, and to become self-content in our selfish comfort zone. It means that in our daily lives, at any time, whenever we personally become victims of any ill-behavior or crime, we should forget and not appeal to the court. When we say that everything is okay, and that we should move on, then we are encouraging chaos and anarchy over order, darkness over light, and death over life.

God Himself says, "Vengeance is Mine, I will repay" (Deut. 32:35 and Romans 12:19). Therefore, let us turn the 110th anniversary's irreversible opportunity, collectively and with determined positive commitment, into the pursuit of justice and righteousness, and through our bitter experience, let us support all the minorities who are the victims of contemporary atrocities in the four corners of the world.

May the Lord lead us from morn to morn (Psalm 45/46.5) to welcome and greet a brighter future for our nation and for all mankind. Amen.

One of the most popular programs of the Armenian Prelacy is the St. Gregory of Datev Institute Summer Program for youth ages 13-18, affectionately called "Datev". Sponsored and organized by the Prelacy's Christian Education Department, the St. Gregory of Datev Institute offers

a unique faith-based program for our youth in a wholesome and nurturing environment with three-pronged objectives: Christian education and formation, prayer and worship, and fellowship and recreational activities.

The comprehensive Christian educational program is completed in four years, one week each summer. Those who complete the program are offered the option to return for post-graduate classes. Each year, the students receive about 20 hours of instruction. The curriculum includes the Bible, the sacraments of the Armenian Church with emphasis on the Divine Liturgy (Soorp Badarak), Armenian Church feasts and saints, Armenian Church creeds and theology, prayer and worship, as well as discussions on contemporary moral and ethical issues.

The daily life of the students at Datev is framed by 20-30 minute morning and evening prayers. Every morning the students assemble at the chapel for the Aravodyan or the Arevakal service according to the tradition of the Armenian church, and at the close of the day, before retiring to their rooms, the students once again gather for the Compline (Husgoom) service.

The daily schedule of the Program is tempered by afternoon sports and recreational activities, as well as with special excursions, all aiming to foster positive and lasting friendships among the students.



"It's all about the team with me," he says.





What Can We Do?

Soorp Asdvadzadzin Church of Whitinsville is committed to helping in any way we can. We have undertaken a new humanitarian effort to provide fresh food, groceries, and toiletries to the families who have either lost a soldier to the Artsakh war, or families who have a wounded hero who cannot work to support their family and the families from Artsakh who have recently been forced to relocated by Azerbaijan to Armenia.

The program is simple. We order Groceries online from the supermarket in Armenia, which are paid for here in the United States. The groceries are delivered the next day to the families. In addition to the families we have "adopted", we have started to help several families from Artsakh who are now living in villages in Armenia.

Response to our AGM (Armenian Grocery Ministry) has been extremely positive and we hope to continue this work for as long as it is needed.

Home Blessings



Throughout history, Armenian Christians have considered the home to be a sacred place: the tranquil sanctuary of the family, where habits of virtue, pious traditions, and life-affirming customs are passed from one generation to another. Under one roof, members of a household achieve a unity of spirit and assume responsibility for the larger life of the community. They break bread and share life's joys and sorrows. Above all, the home is where one's faith in God is first kindled, and where that faith finds some of the most profound occasions for action. God's presence makes every family home a "Little Church" (in Greek, ecclesia), where His love and blessings permeate every corner. Through a special ceremony, we ask God to bless our homes on occasions like the Nativity and Resurrection of Christ, as well as on the joyous occasion of moving into a new home. It's called the Dounohrnek, or Home Blessing service.

During a Home Blessing, the priest takes with him wafer and incense. He blesses bread, water, and salt: three fundamental elements essential for human life. The priest asks God not to lessen these three gifts, without which life becomes impossible or imperfect.

The bread, water, and salt are symbols of God's infinite goodness and care.

Bread, which symbolically represents the Word of God, grants life to all those who taste it.

Salt seasons our food, making it delicious and edible. Metaphorically, salt represents man in this world with his words and deeds; Christ said, "You are the salt of the earth." Man's life should be seasoned with wisdom, moderation, or a sense of sufficiency.

Finally, **Water**, the essential element of life, represents cleanliness. Through the water of baptism, we are cleansed, renewed in Christ, and united with our God.

Alongside the bread, salt, and water offered on a tray by the home-dwellers, the priest places the wafer stamped with a crucifix and designs of grapes and wheat. The wafer signifies the presence of Christ in the home. The members of the family can either distribute the wafer among themselves or keep it in a jar along with flour, salt, or rice.

During a Home Blessing, it is customary to burn incense, symbolizing the burning of our souls with our Lord's love. In his prayer the Psalmist said: "Let my prayer be counted as incense before Thee."

In the prayer of the Home Blessing the priest first asks for purity and abundance of the three gifts. Then he blesses the home and all its inhabitants, asks God to keep them away from visible and invisible enemies, and prays that God will protect them and grant them health of soul and body.
