

1 JOHN 5:13-21

I write these things to you who believe in the name of the Son of God, so that you may know that you have eternal life.

And this is the boldness we have in him, that if we ask anything according to his will, he hears us. And if we know that he hears us in whatever we ask, we know that we have obtained the requests made of him. If you see your brother or sister committing what is not a mortal sin, you will ask, and God will give life to such a one—to those whose sin is not mortal. There is sin that is mortal; I do not say that you should pray about that. All wrongdoing is sin, but there is sin that is not mortal.

We know that those who are born of God do not sin, but the one who was born of God protects them, and the evil one does not touch them. We know that we are God's children, and that the whole world lies under the power of the evil one. And we know that the Son of God has come and has given us understanding so that we may know him who is true; and we are in him who is true, in his Son Jesus Christ. He is the true God and eternal life.

Little children, keep yourselves from idols.

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO

JOHN 12:12-23

The next day the great crowd that had come to the festival heard that Jesus was coming to Jerusalem. So they took branches of palm trees and went out to meet him, shouting,

"Hosanna! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord the King of Israel!"

Jesus found a young donkey and sat on it; as it is written: "Do not be afraid, daughter of Zion. Look, your king is coming, sitting on a donkey's colt!"

LITURGICAL CALENDAR AND NEWS FROM PRELACY CROSSROADS

NATIONAL REPRESENTATIVE ASSEMBLY CONVENES IN WATERTOWN



St. Stephen's Church in Watertown, Massachusetts, is hosting the 2025 National Representative Assembly (NRA) of the Eastern Prelacy from May 29 to 31, presided by His Eminence Archbishop Anoushavan, Prelate. Clergy and lay delegates from across the Eastern United States have gathered to participate in the annual deliberations that guide the spiritual and administrative direction of the Prelacy. The clergy conference, also presided by the Prelate, was held on Wednesday, May 28.


This year's Assembly opened with a message from His Holiness Aram I, Catholicos of the Great House of Cilicia, marking the Year of the Revitalization of Traditions. The message set the tone for the sessions to follow, as delegates prepared to address current priorities and challenges facing the church and its parishes. "What the Church does is a God-given and people-oriented mission," His Holiness said. "À mission, which is expressed through education, social service, and pastoral care."

In his message to the Assembly, His Eminence highlighted the importance of tradition. "When we understand the true meaning of tradition, we may see that tradition is neither an ossified entity nor an anachronism, but rather we appreciate that tradition is the power of creativity, of continuity and constant innovation, of keeping the family, community and nation attached to their roots, and of mobilizing its present potentials for a better future."

Over the next two days, representatives will engage in comprehensive discussions and hear reports on the Prelacy's religious, educational, and financial activities. Hosted in the vibrant parish of Watertown—one of the Eastern Prelacy's most active communities—the Assembly is expected to offer renewed perspectives on strengthening parish life and bolstering intergenerational involvement in church mission.

Crossroads will provide full coverage of the proceedings and decisions of the Assembly in its upcoming issues. Stay tuned for updates on key developments, reflections from participants, and highlights from this pivotal gathering in the life of the Prelacy.

TRADITION: POWER OF CONTINUITY AND INNOVATION



Dear spiritual brothers in Christ,

NRA delegates, and guests,

This year the entire Christendom is celebrating the 1700 anniversary of the first Ecumenical Council held in Nicaea, where our confession of Faith was composed, which we recite every Sunday during the Soorp Badarak. His Holiness has continued the tradition marking each year with a theme and has proclaimed 2025 as the year of revitalizing Tradition. The Catholicos' message was published and broadcasted at the new year. My intention today is to turn the essence of the message of revitalizing Tradition as the motive power of our activities throughout our Prelacy and across our communities. I would like to adopt a pragmatic approach in sharing my views here.

There is no doubt that for the AI generation the word "tradition" has no place as a remnant of antiquity. Yet, the true understanding and practices of sustaining tradition have an existential role in society in general, and in the life of our nation, in particular. Hence, I would like to quote a statement from the message of His Holiness, and make it the focus of my thoughts: "We need to preserve tradition. Our traditions impacted by the environment in the course of history must be harmonized with the spirit and conditions of the present, as well as with our expectations and needs, without losing their essential elements and uniqueness. In other words, it is necessary to preserve the core and reform the shell."

ST. GREGORY OF DATEV INSTITUTE









July 6-13, 2025 The Summer Program will take place at Shiloh Bible Camp & Retreat Center 753 Burnt Meadow Road Hewitt, NJ 07421

One of the most popular programs of the Armenian Prelacy is the St. Gregory of Datev Institute Summer Program for youth ages 13-18, affectionately called "Datev". Sponsored and organized by the Prelacy's Christian Education Department, the St. Gregory of Datev Institute offers a unique faith-based program for our youth in a wholesome and nurturing environment with three-pronged objectives: Christian education and formation, prayer and worship, and fellowship and recreational activities.

The comprehensive Christian educational program is completed in four years, one week each summer. Those who complete the program are offered the option to return for post-graduate classes. Each year, the students receive about 20 hours of instruction. The curriculum includes the Bible, the sacraments of the Armenian Church with emphasis on the Divine Liturgy (Soorp Badarak), Armenian Church feasts and saints, Armenian Church creeds and theology, prayer and worship, as well as discussions on contemporary moral and ethical issues.

The daily life of the students at Datev is framed by 20-30 minute morning and evening prayers. Every morning the students assemble at the chapel for the Aravodyan or the Arevakal service according to the tradition of the Armenian church, and at the close of the day, before retiring to their rooms, the students once again gather for the Compline (Husgoom) service.

The daily schedule of the Program is tempered by afternoon sports and recreational activities, as well as with special excursions, all aiming to foster positive and lasting friendships among the students.


Memorial Day Requiem Service At The Armenian Heritage Monument



- Invite your friends and neighbors to set up too! All are welcome!


Save the Date: Admission to the buying public is free!

What Can We Do?

Soorp Asdvadzadzin Church of Whitinsville is committed to helping in any way we can. We have undertaken a new humanitarian effort to provide fresh food, groceries, and toiletries to the families who have either lost a soldier to the Artsakh war, or families who have a wounded hero who cannot work to support their family and the families from Artsakh who have recently been forced to relocated by Azerbaijan to Armenia.

The program is simple. We order Groceries online from the supermarket in Armenia, which are paid for here in the United States. The groceries are delivered the next day to the families. In addition to the families we have "adopted", we have started to help several families from Artsakh who are now living in villages in Armenia.



Home Blessings



Throughout history, Armenian Christians have considered the home to be a sacred place: the tranquil sanctuary of the family, where habits of virtue, pious traditions, and life-affirming customs are passed from one generation to another. Under one roof, members of a household achieve a unity of spirit and assume responsibility for the larger life of the community. They break bread and share life's joys and sorrows. Above all, the home is where one's faith in God is first kindled, and where that faith finds some of the most profound occasions for action. God's presence makes every family home a "Little Church" (in Greek, ecclesia), where His love and blessings permeate every corner. Through a special ceremony, we ask God to bless our homes on occasions like the Nativity and Resurrection of Christ, as well as on the joyous occasion of moving into a new home. It's called the Dounohrnek, or Home Blessing service.

During a Home Blessing, the priest takes with him wafer and incense. He blesses bread, water, and salt: three fundamental elements essential for human life. The priest asks God not to lessen these three gifts, without which life becomes impossible or imperfect.

The bread, water, and salt are symbols of God's infinite goodness and care.

Bread, which symbolically represents the Word of God, grants life to all those who taste it.

Salt seasons our food, making it delicious and edible. Metaphorically, salt represents man in this world with his words and deeds; Christ said, *"You are the salt of the earth."* Man's life should be seasoned with wisdom, moderation, or a sense of sufficiency.

Finally, **Water**, the essential element of life, represents cleanliness. Through the water of baptism, we are cleansed, renewed in Christ, and united with our God.

Alongside the bread, salt, and water offered on a tray by the homedwellers, the priest places the wafer stamped with a crucifix and designs of grapes and wheat. The wafer signifies the presence of Christ in the home. The members of the family can either distribute the wafer among themselves or keep it in a jar along with flour, salt, or rice.

During a Home Blessing, it is customary to burn incense, symbolizing the burning of our souls with our Lord's love. In his prayer the Psalmist said: "Let my prayer be counted as incense before Thee."

In the prayer of the Home Blessing the priest first asks for purity and abundance of the three gifts. Then he blesses the home and all its inhabitants, asks God to keep them away from visible and invisible enemies, and prays that God will protect them and grant them health of soul and body.
