
PRAYER OF THE WEEK

Pentecost

Acts 2:1-21

When the day of Pentecost came, they were all together in one place. Suddenly a sound like the blowing of a violent wind came from heaven and filled the whole house where they were sitting. They saw what seemed to be tongues of fire that separated and came to rest on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues as the Spirit enabled them.

Now there were staying in Jerusalem God-fearing Jews from every nation under heaven. When they heard this sound, a crowd came together in bewilderment, because each one heard their own language being spoken. Utterly amazed, they asked: "Aren't all these who are speaking Galileans? Then how is it that each of us hears them in our native language? Parthians, Medes and Elamites; residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya near Cyrene; visitors from Rome (both Jews and converts to Judaism); Cretans and Arabs—we hear them declaring the wonders of God in our own tongues!" Amazed and perplexed, they asked one another, "What does this mean?" Some, however, made fun of them and said, "They have had too much wine."

Then Peter stood up with the Eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd: "Fellow Jews and all of you who live in Jerusalem, let me explain this to you; listen carefully to what I say. These people are not drunk, as you suppose. It's only nine in the morning! No, this is what was spoken by the prophet Joel:

"'In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all people. Your sons and daughters will prophesy, your young men will see visions, your old men will dream dreams.

Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days, and they will prophesy.

I will show wonders in the heavens above and signs on the earth below, blood and fire and billows of smoke.

The sun will be turned to darkness and the moon to blood before the coming of the great and glorious day of the Lord.

And everyone who calls on the name of the Lord will be saved.'

"I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you. Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid. You heard me say to you, 'I am going away, and I am coming to you.' If you loved me, you would rejoice that I am going to the Father, because the Father is greater than I. And now I have told you this before it occurs, so that when it does occur, you may believe. I will no longer talk much with you, for the ruler of this world is coming. He has no power over me; but I do as the Father. Rise, let us be on our way."

LITURGICAL CALENDAR AND NEWS FROM PRELACY CROSSROADS

EASTERN PRELACY ASSEMBLY CONVENES IN WATERTOWN, ADVANCES REFORMS AND RENEWAL AGENDA



His Eminence Archbishop Anoushavan, Prelate, opened the Assembly with prayers, appointing Movses Shrikian as chair and Janet Haroian as secretary of the temporary presiding panel. The Assembly later elected its presiding panel, confirming Mr. Shrikian as chair and voting Ms. Haroian as co-chair, with Rev. Fr. Samuel Ajemian and Bea Movsesian as Armenian and English secretaries.

Delegates approved the agenda and heard a video message from His Holiness Aram I, who designated 2025 as the year of Renewal of Traditions and emphasized the Church's enduring role in modern society. The Catholicos called on the faithful to preserve the Armenian Church's spiritual and cultural foundations while remaining actively engaged with modern society. He thanked Archbishop Anoushavan for his dedicated leadership at the helm of the Prelacy.

Archbishop Anoushavan echoed this message in his remarks, highlighting the importance of tradition, community, and innovation.

Very Rev. Fr. Hrant Tahanian, Pastor of St. Stephen's Church, and Board of Trustees Chair Dn. John Daghlian welcomed participants and highlighted community initiatives, including the expansion of St. Stephen's Armenian Elementary School.

Rev. Fr. Arakel Aljalian, Pastor of St. James Church (Watertown, Ma.), conveyed best wishes from Bishop Mesrop Parsamyan and the Eastern Diocese. Representatives from sister organizations also delivered greetings and program updates. Garo Tashian, representing the Hairenik Association and the ARF, reaffirmed the church's central role in the Armenian national identity. Heather Apigian Krafian spoke on behalf of the Armenian Relief Society Eastern Region, highlighting the ARS's 115year mission and ongoing collaboration with the Prelacy. Hasmig Aprahamian, representing Hamazkayin Eastern USA, presented several youth-centered cultural initiatives by the organization. Vicken Khatchadorian, of Homenetmen, emphasized the organization's youth sports and scouting activities, while Executive Council Secretary Tamar Kanarian read a message from the Armenian Youth Federation reaffirming their close ties with parish communities.

The Executive Council report, presented by Chair Aram Sarafian, covered the Prelacy's current programs, strategic planning, and finances. Delegates raised questions about clergy training in the United States and the expansion of parish missions. It was noted that clergy preparation is available through existing institutions. Expanding parishes requires both initiative and financial support, as illustrated by communities with large Armenian populations but limited local engagement.

Other presentations included a report by Alice Simonian Buratti on the absentee voting pilot program carried out by Sts. Vartanantz Church (Providence, Rhode Island) and a discussion led by Anoush Baghdassarian, Esq., on "Identity and Justice in Rerooted Armenian Communities."

Crossroads will continue to report on the National Representative Assembly and the issues raised by the delegates, as well as the proposals aimed at strengthening the Armenian community and the parish life across the Eastern United States.

NATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF LADIES' GUILDS MEETS IN WATERTOWN



On Thursday and Friday, May 29 and 30, ladies representing ten parishes of the Eastern Prelacy met in Watertown, Massachusetts, for the conference of the National Association of Ladies' Guilds, which annually coincides with the National Representative Assembly.

The conference began jointly with the first session of the Assembly and was opened by a prayer service followed by the message from His Holiness Aram I, Catholicos of the Great House of Cilicia. Following this message, NALG representatives retired to a separate meeting room to discuss issues specifically focused on providing guidance to help strengthen the commitment and service of each Ladies Guild within their local parishes.

During the two-day conference, a representative of each parish presented an overview of activities held in their local churches during the year, as well as shared ideas and offered suggestions to their sister guilds.

His Eminence Archbishop Anoushavan, Prelate, addressed the group expressing his support and encouragement to continue its efforts in works for the Prelacy and local parishes. Becky Megerdichian, President of the St. Stephen's (Watertown) Ladies Guild graciously welcomed the participants to the community.

Also, Sarineh Cunningham, a graduate of the St. Gregory of Datev Institute, spoke of her experiences while attending the program. She enthusiastically shared stories of learning about our Armenian faith, religious practices, and traditions while meeting and bonding with youth from different parishes.

The NALG annually holds a raffle which provides for financial support to the Datev Institute and the Prelacy Orphan Support Fund. This year, the attendees voted to become annual Pillars of the Prelacy. The raffle winners were Cynthia Bently (Philadelphia), \$1,000, and the St. Illuminator's Cathedral Ladies Guild (New York), \$500.




FOR BREAD AND HOPE TOGETHER WITH ARTSAKH ARMENIANS



A hundred thousand Armenians from Artsakh have been forcibly expelled from their ancestral territory following the criminal policies of the Azerbaijani state and relocated to Armenia proper. While they are trying to solve their primary needs of housing, food, and other urgent issues, they also rely on the continuous help of the Diaspora.

This Sunday (June 8), the Armenian Church celebrates the Feast of Pentecost (Hokekalousd), the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the Apostles, and the birth of the Church. Jesus had commanded His apostles to "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations" (Matthew 28:19). Recognizing the difficulty of this great responsibility, Christ had advised his disciples not to begin their teaching mission until after the "descent of the Holy Spirit."

In the Acts of the Apostles, we read that on that day of Pentecost the apostles gathered in one place, and suddenly a strong wind seemed to fill the house in which they were assembled, and they were filled with the Holy Spirit (see reading above). It was the Jewish feast of Pentecost (Shabuoth) commemorating the giving of the law on Mount Sinai and many different people from different lands had come to Jerusalem. They marveled that they could understand the Apostles' words. This day when the Holy Spirit descended upon the Apostles marked the beginning of the mission of the Church to spread the Good News throughout the world.

In a sense, Pentecost is the opposite of what occurred in the Old Testament story of the Tower of Babel when God disapproved of the building of a tower to reach the heavens and he created confusion by having the workers suddenly speak in different tongues, and unable to understand each other. At Pentecost He gave the disciples the ability to speak other tongues and thus be able to be understood by everyone everywhere.

Life-creating God, lover of mankind Spirit, with tongues of fire you enlightened those assembled in unity and love; therefore, we also celebrate today your holy descent.

Filled with joy by your coming, the Holy Apostles began in differentsounding tongues to call into unity them that had been divided from each other; therefore, we also celebrate today your holy descent.

By spiritual and holy baptism, through them you have adorned the universe with a new and radiant garment; therefore, we also celebrate your holy descent. (From the Canon for the First Day of Pentecost according to the Liturgical Canons of the Armenian Church)


The teachers, under the guiadance of Victoria Waterman are looking forward to welcoming the children back in September.

- Invite your friends and neighbors to set up too! All are welcome!


Save the Date: Admission to the buying public is free!

What Can We Do?

Soorp Asdvadzadzin Church of Whitinsville is committed to helping in any way we can. We have undertaken a new humanitarian effort to provide fresh food, groceries, and toiletries to the families who have either lost a soldier to the Artsakh war, or families who have a wounded hero who cannot work to support their family and the families from Artsakh who have recently been forced to relocated by Azerbaijan to Armenia.

The program is simple. We order Groceries online from the supermarket in Armenia, which are paid for here in the United States. The groceries are delivered the next day to the families. In addition to the families we have "adopted", we have started to help several families from Artsakh who are now living in villages in Armenia.




