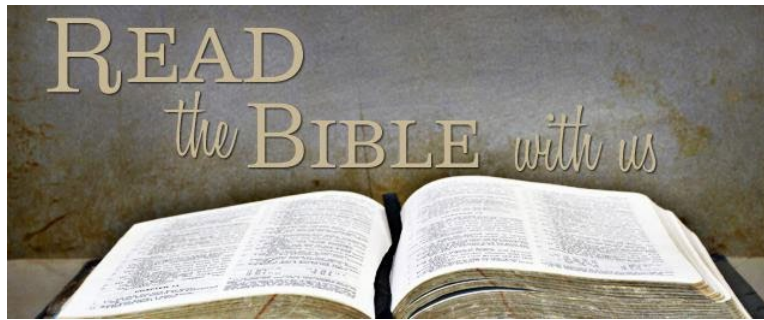

Paregentan of the Fast of Transfiguration

ROMANS 11:13-24

Now I am speaking to you Gentiles. Inasmuch then as I am an apostle to the Gentiles, I glorify my ministry in order to make my own people jealous, and thus save some of them. For if their rejection is the reconciliation of the world, what will their acceptance be but life from the dead! If the part of the dough offered as first fruits is holy, then the whole batch is holy; and if the root is holy, then the branches also are holy.

But if some of the branches were broken off, and you, a wild olive shoot, were grafted in their place to share the rich root of the olive tree, do not boast over the branches. If you do boast, remember that it is not you that support the root, but the root that supports you. You will say, "Branches were broken off so that I might be grafted in. That is true. They were broken off because of their unbelief, but you stand only through faith. So do not become proud, but stand in awe. For if God did not spare the natural branches, perhaps he will not spare you. Note then the kindness and the severity of God: severity toward those who have fallen, but God's kindness toward you, provided you continue in his kindness; otherwise you also will be cut off. And even those of Israel, if they do not persist in unbelief, will be grafted in, for God has the power to graft them in again. For if you have been cut from what is by nature a wild olive tree and grafted, contrary to nature, into a cultivated olive tree, how much more will these natural branches be grafted back into their own olive tree.

THE HOLY GOSPEL OF JESUS CHRIST ACCORDING TO

MATTHEW 14:13-21

Now when Jesus heard this, he withdrew from there in a boat to a deserted place by himself. But when the crowds heard it, they followed him on foot from the towns. When he went ashore, he saw a great crowd; and he had compassion for them and cured their sick. When it was evening, the disciples came to him and said, "This is a deserted place, and the hour is now late; send the crowds away so that they may go into the villages and buy food for themselves." Jesus said to them, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat." They replied, "We have nothing here but five loaves and two fish." And he said, "Bring them here to me." Then he ordered the crowds to sit down on the grass. Taking the five loaves and two fish, he looked up to heaven, and blessed and broke the loaves, and gave them to the disciples, and the disciples gave them to the crowds. And all ate and were filled; and they took up what was left over of the broken pieces, twelve baskets full. And those who ate were about five thousand men, besides women and children.

LITURGICAL CALENDAR AND NEWS FROM PRELACY CROSSROADS

ONE NATION UNDER GOD AT 250



A short speech by Abraham Lincoln has become a historical referent and can be said to be a foundational text of the modern United States. His Gettysburg Address is memorable from the first line to the last: at fewer than three hundred words, it was shorter than most news pieces we hurriedly read every day.

Yet it is the last words that are etched in our individual and collective memory: “this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom—and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.”

Today the Battle of Gettysburg in 1863 is remembered as much for Lincoln’s speech as for its military significance. Commending the heroism of the fallen, President Lincoln had famously said: “The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here.”

Indeed, the opposite has been true. As Senator Charles Sumner observed only two years later, in 1865, “The world noted at once what he said, and will never cease to remember it.” In Sumner’s words, “The battle itself was less important than the speech.”

While his statement that the battle was less important than the speech is debatable, Senator Sumner's assessment of the enduring significance of the Gettysburg Address still holds true. More importantly, President Lincoln, at that painful time for a country that had not yet reached its centennial and was deciding by force of arms what course the nation organized by the Founding Fathers would take, had the providential foresight to envision the America we live in today 250 years after the first, seminal Fourth of July, a country reborn in freedom, with a government of the people, by the people, and for the people.

The Gettysburg Address also helped shape the language through which Americans have come to understand their nation as "one nation under God," a phrase later incorporated into the Pledge of Allegiance. How could words best summarize the magnificent conception of this incredibly rich and diverse, ever renewing nation, under Divine Providence?

Perhaps we can sense an echo of Matthew 22:21 in the spirit of these words: "Render therefore to Caesar the things that are Caesar's, and to God the things that are God's." One extraordinary attribute of the great American nation is how remarkably both spheres have coexisted and contributed to a mutually enriching environment, making the United States a fiercely free and profoundly faithful nation at the same time. As St. John Chrysostom had said in his interpretation of Matthew's verse, what is rendered to Caesar—in this case, the government—should not come at the expense of piety.

And it is precisely in that fine balance that the extraordinary American experiment lies, one that, under the caring gaze of our Lord, turns 250. May God bless America every day it is reborn in freedom.

DATEV SUMMER PROGRAM IN SESSION



The Eastern Prelacy's St. Gregory of Datev Institute commenced its 40th annual Summer Program for youth (ages 13–18) at Shiloh Bible Camp and Retreat Center in Hewitt, New Jersey, on Sunday, June 28, with the participation of 35 students from nine parishes. ELISHA THE PROPHET



Yesterday, Thursday, July 2, the Armenian Church celebrated the Feast of Elisha the Prophet, whose life and works are recorded in 1 and 2

Kings. Elisha (“God is Salvation”) was a disciple of the Prophet Elijah, who at God’s command anointed Elisha, a simple farmer, to be his successor much like Jesus later did in calling his disciples in Galilee. Elisha performs miracles, healing the sick and reviving the dead, a harbinger of the Gospel miracles. His message to his followers was that they should return to traditional religious practices and acknowledge God’s sovereignty over all aspects of life. When he healed the sick, it was to demonstrate God’s power over life and death: when he helped in battle, it was to demonstrate God’s power over nations.

TWELVE APOSTLES OF CHRIST AND SAINT PAUL, THE THIRTEENTH APOSTLE



On Saturday (July 4) the Armenian Church celebrates the Feast of the Twelve Apostles of Christ and Saint Paul, who is considered to be the “thirteenth apostle.”

Jesus selected twelve apostles to carry on His work and instructed them to preach and to baptize converts all over the world (Mt. 28:19-20). He gave the title “apostle” to the twelve (Luke 6:13; Mark 3:14). The word apostle derives from the Greek word *apostellein* (*arakyal* in Armenian). The apostles dedicated their lives to spreading the Word and fulfilling the

sacred mission entrusted to them. Their mission was not just to transmit the message but to put it into practice.

Paul (formerly known as Saul) was initially an enemy of Christians and persecuted them. He had a vision on the road to Damascus and became a fervent Christian convert and was subsequently responsible in large measure for the rapid spread of the new religion. A good part of the New Testament is from the writings of Paul.

The Armenian Church has its roots in the apostolic ministry of the apostles Thaddeus and Bartholomew) and is therefore known as “apostolic” (arakelagan).

“Seer of the ineffable paradise, the third heaven, you who contemplated the higher things and interpreted profound mysteries, thirteenth holy Apostle Paul, universal father, intercede for us to the Lord.”

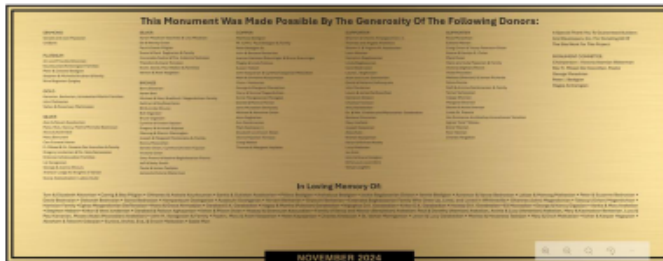

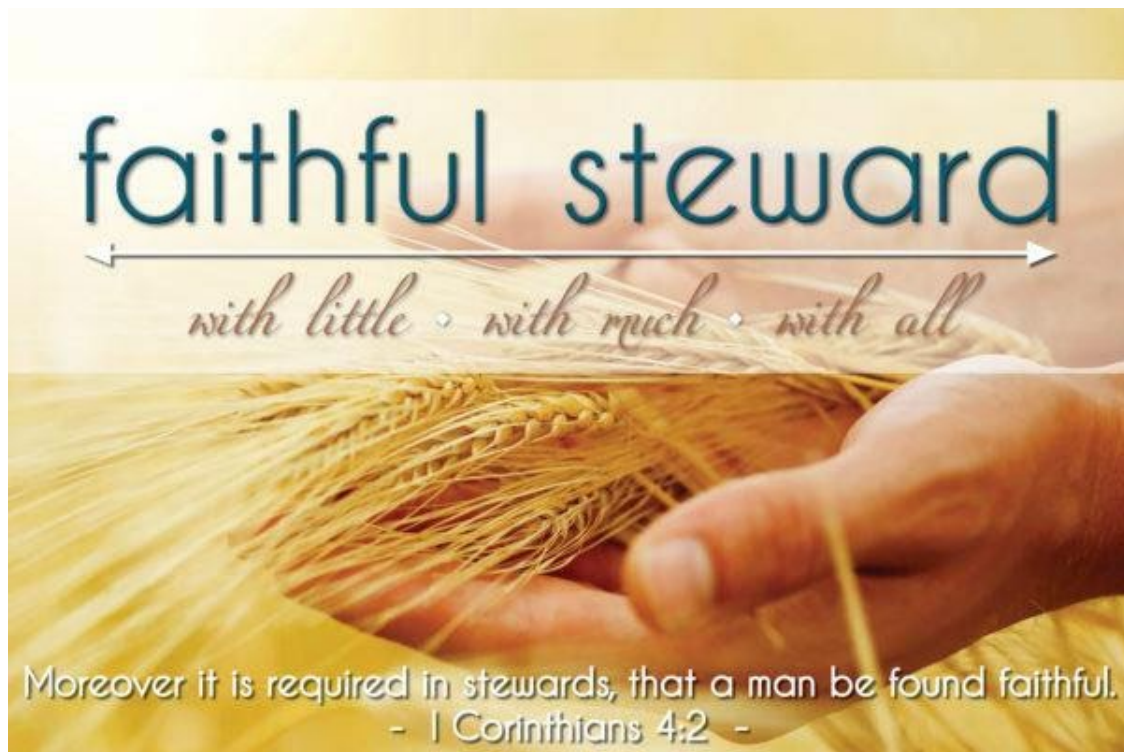

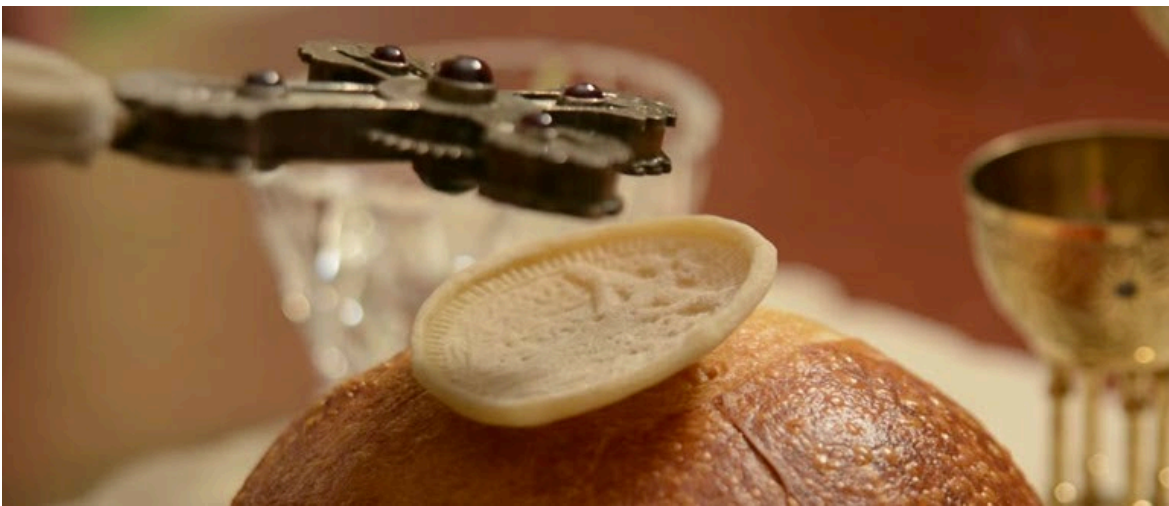
Lighting Candles and Prayer Requests
